## Hugo's Fords of Interest From Rogue River to Grave Creek

Fords are relatively shallow places in a body of water, such as a river, where one can cross by walking, or riding on an animal, or in a vehicle such as a wagon or automobile. Many times a ford would require the sides of gullies, streams, or rivers to be dug out and the bottoms filled in to allow for the passage of wagons. The cover photograph is an example of a truck ford on Grave Creek along Placer Road (approximately mile 8).

## Diaries, Journals and Reminiscences: 1846 - 1847

North of the Rogue River in 1846 the wagon train was spread out and there were at least three companies.<sup>4</sup>



Scott with 1<sup>st</sup> company at Pearce Riffle ford on JR road. Pringle with 2<sup>nd</sup> company did not follow Scott when he heard the way was blocked and used the Fort Vannoy ford on IV road, and the last

wagon train on IV road believed to be comprised of the following companies: Harrison Linville, Vanderpool, including the Rev. Cornwall.

1853 Military Road Brevet Major B. Alvord, United State Army surveyed the 1853 Military Road (combination of existing and proposed routes) from Myrtle Creek to Jacksonville, Oregon. 5-6

# General Land Office (GLO) Surveys & Maps

1855 & 1856 GLO Surveys The military road was the Jacksonville Road of the Applegate Trail as built when recorded by the 1855 GLO survey in Josephine County, Oregon. The Applegate Trail was also the Illinois Valley Road.

Ferries "In 1851 Joel Perkins commenced operation of a ferry near the confluence of the Rogue and Applegate rivers. Later known as Vannoy's Ferry, this crossing served both emigrants and miners, especially those traveling to the Illinois Valley. Farther up the Rogue, Evans's Ferry and Derbin's Ferry offered 1853 ferry crossings of the river." 1 & 7
