The J. C. Cochrane Family, Early Pioneers: 1893 - 1939

History³ The John C. Cochrane House on Quartz Creek was constructed ca., 1895 for John Cochrane and his wife Florence (Neely) Cochrane. He moved with his parents to Michigan as a child. At the age of 21 he worked in the woods, then practiced the butchering trade for one year. He then went to Josephine County where he purchased his farm in 1893. He married Florence Neely on October 11, 1893, and the two planned their new home. Florence Neely was the daughter of Elizabeth Vannoy (Gibson) Neely, and James Neely who lived on their ranch on Jump-Off-Joe Creek.


Through the years the Cochrane ranch was known as one of the most valuable in the area. During the first decade of the twentieth century, John Cochrane operated a dairy farm on the property. They raised several children at the ranch. After they passed Emmett continued to live on the Quartz Creek Ranch, while another son, Gordon, settled on their mother's property on Jump-Off Joe Creek.

1932 The Quartz Creek School District No. 47 is clearly identified on the J. C. Cochrane Ranch.

1939 John Cochrane died October 20, 1939, about one month after the death of his wife.³

Importance³ The John C. Cochrane House has received little exterior alteration, and with its relatively intact setting is a good representative of nineteenth century substantial farm houses in Josephine County.
