1960s 30-plus year old Bill Thatcher was looking for a rumored 1880s Chinese railroad camp along the SPR right-of-way (ROW) near what would become Three Pines Road north of Three Pines, Oregon. He was walking the railroad ROW on the communications line side which would be cut down in 1978.1 This line had 10-foot

long, 10 insulator pin cross arms, and their attached insulators. Many were still standing and many were on the ground. This is where he found the three light blueish-aqua color insulators he donated to the *Hugo Neighborhood*.

Southern Pacific Railroad's (SPR) Communications Line

Brookfield Huge quantities of insulators marked "W.BROOKFIELD", "BROOKFIELD", and later, with just a "B", were produced. Brookfield maintained business offices in Manhattan throughout most if its history, and these office addresses were embossed on many of the earlier insulators. 55 FULTON ST (1868-1882); 45 CLIFF ST (1882-1890) and 83 FULTON ST (1890-1893).

CD Numbers Consolidated Design (CD) numbers are assigned to specific shapes of pintype glass insulators, regardless of the manufacturer, embossing or style number. See **CJOW Magazine** for explanation. ² http://www.crownjewelsofthewire.com/

Brookfield CD 133 (No.1) This insulator was associated with the **Postal Telegraph Company**, a new telegraph company created in 1881 to compete with Western Union.³ It was built through Josephine County ca., 1886 - 1887. The following embossing is on the insulator.

This telegraph system was expanded to six lines in Hugo before it was abandoned to the elements in the middle 1940's.

Telephone Line CD 102 "Ponies"

CD 102 Ponies The two small insulators both have the same CD number: 102. They are nicknamed "ponies" and were use on rural, open wire, telephone lines c.a., 1900 - 1930. Sometimes such lines ran from tree to tree with the insulators mounted on side pegs. Both are very common in aqua.²

Howard Banks wrote: "CD 133s were used on the Postal Telegraph Line in the Hugo area. The CD 133s I found on the Postal Telegraph Line in the 1960's along Oxyoke Road had the Brookfield name on one side of the dome and an 1870 patent date on the other. Sometime the embossing is weak and you have to look hard to spot it. The CD 133 style was manufactured by numerous companies from the 1880's through the 1920's. They are common in aqua colored glass and were often used on telegraph lines. I have also taken them off side pegs on trees where they had been used on open wire telephone lines."
