
#### Hugo Emigrant Trails Committee<sup>1-2</sup>

On July 21, 2003 six volunteers<sup>1-2</sup> found a 310' segment of the Applegate Trail (*Trail*) on the south slope of Grave Creek Hills at Mt. Sexton Pass: Hal Anthony, Malcolm Drake, Wayne McKy, Boyd Peters, Karen Rose, and Mike Walker. The segment's



location is identified by the 1850s and 1890s Government Land Office surveys and maps, and a 1895 county map.

The road segment is on a side hill (ca., 1853 - 1900) orientated the only way over the Grave Creek Hills, Mt. Sexton Pass. The road width was 9' - 10'. A large 75 - 85 year old fir tree (dbh 33") was

growing in the *Trail* segment which means the road had not been used since the late 1930s.

**1853** Larry McLane, Historian<sup>3</sup>, feels that the road segment is the 1853 military road from Oakland, Oregon to Fort Steward surveyed and improved by Major B. Alvord, U.S. Surveyor.

## Wagon Trail Inventory - OR- JA-00-34-06-23 Mt. Sexton Pass

1860s Howard Banks, Insulator Expert<sup>4</sup>, feels that the road segment could go back to the Collins Telegraph Line in the 1860s when the line construction, in some places, went from tree to tree. He based this conclusion on some very old galvanized steel telegraph wire in an old oak tree along the road. The tree was rotted and deteriorated. By the time that the Postal Telegraph Line was built through Hugo in the 1870s - 1880s, everything was pole to pole. In Banks's opinion this telegraph wire predated the Postal Telegraph Line.



#### Applegate Trail Segment: Mt. Sexton Pass

**1870s - 1880s** A down pole was identified by Banks<sup>4</sup> as a Postal Telegraph pole near the road segment.

In 1941 a new right-of-way on Sexton was cleared.<sup>5</sup> The residence [Smith house] overlooking the Pacific Highway summit on the shoulder of Mt. Sexton was raised and trees felled for a

new road. The 1941 newspaper article had a photograph whose orientation was "toward the summit from the Grants



Pass side showing the steep, old dirt road on the left (Trail segment), the curving present high on the right, and the felled trees on the right-of-way." The grade of the Trail segment aligns with the original summit elevation.

**Administration** The *Trail* segment is located on land administered by the Oregon Dept. of Transportation.

**Used Trail** The *Trail* segment retains elements of its original character, but shows use by motor vehicles.


