**1913** The Embroidery club was entertained by Mrs. Thomas Larsen on June 11, and Mrs. McKy June 25, much to the credit of both. Refreshments were served. *Rogue River Courier*, June 27, 1913. Hugo Items. 1906 Hugo has a post office, store, good schoolhouse and will soon have a dairy in operation.


Its history mission is to educate, collect, preserve, interpret, and research its local history and to encourage public interest in the history of the Hugo area.
