1913 Dr. F. H. Ingram, a nerve specialist of Portland, visits Hugo every other day. He has his office at the Mastin residence and with his remarkable skill, he is rendering some wonderful relief. *Rogue River Courier*. April 4, 1913. <u>Hugo Items</u>.

There is no sickness in Hugo and a doctor would starve here. *Rogue River Courier*. May 28, 1913. Hugo Items.

Mild attacks of la grippe are visiting our citizens. *Rogue River Courier*. June 6, 1913. Hugo Items.

1920 Dr. Loughridge was called to the Wm.

Buffington home Wednesday where the children have the whooping cough. One of the little girls has pneumonia. Rogue River Courier. October 8, 1920.

1938 The fourth semi-annual child health conference was held at the Hugo Health Center with Dr. S. B. Osgood and county nurse, Edith Phipps. These clinics were held semi-annually as complete check-up and permanent records for the children. It was a free public health service.¹

1940 Nine children were examined at the Hugo clinic given at the schoolhouse by Dr. S. B. Osgood and nurse Edith Phippls. Three children were unable to come and be examined.¹
