1912 April of 1912 showed the Josephine County growing as reflected by the 1,985 names of voters registered to vote in the primary election.

The figures showed 1,254 republicans, 458 democrats, 8 prohibitionists, 155 socialists, 49 independent, 17 non-partisan, 22 not stated, 20 refuse to state, one populist, and one "suffragette."

1912 On Thursday evening, Oct. 29, several of the Hugo voters and would be voters gathered at the church to listen to the speech of H. H. Basler of Grants Pass upon the local option question.

Mr. Basler proved himself to be a pleasing and forceful speaker, a man who is throughly competent to handle the question in an intelligent and convincing way.

His arguments were clear cut, decisive and strong. Having spent several years in active work on the temperance question and having acted for six years as county judge in Nebraska, thus being able to discuss the question from a financial, moral and legal standpoint, he is able to speak with authority, and those who were fortunate enough to hear him were not slow or backward in declaring it to be the best speech they had heard on the temperance question. *Rogue River Courier*. November 1, 1912. <u>Mr. Basler Talks to</u> <u>Hugo Voters.</u> **1912** The Hugo Development league has filed a complaint in the offices of the railroad commission against the Southern Pacific company, alleging the depot facilities and train service are altogether inadequate for a town the size of Hugo, which says the complaint, has 250 inhabitants. *Rogue River Courier*. November 15, 1912. <u>Hugo Citizens Kick.</u>

1913 The Development League is a great help and benefit, having good plans in view which it intends to carry out. *Rogue River Courier*. April 4, 1913. <u>Hugo Items.</u>

Owing to the energy and perseverance of the Development League, Hugo is soon to be blessed with a new depot for accommodation and room. It is needed very much and it is whispered the Southern Pacific Co. intends to build a section house also. *Rogue River Courier*. April 11, 1913. <u>Hugo Items.</u>

1913 Tuesday was a red letter day for Hugo. The Development League cleared the streets and laid out plans for a park and the general beautifying of the town. We do hope the boys keep up the good work. *Rogue River Courier*. January 18, 1913. Hugo.
