### The state apportionment of school money for

Josephine County this year amounts to \$2.06 per pupil and Superintendent Savage has been distributing the fund to school districts. Six districts are yet without their share on account of the failure of the school clerks to file their bond with the county superintendent, and when this is done the money will be available. The amount for the year is \$5.840.40 and with a balance from school lands, etc. makes the total for this county amount to \$6,468.40. *Rogue River Courier*. August 16, 1912. School Money On Hand.
