Jacksonville Road (JR) Of Applegate Trail (*Trail*): Grave Creek Road (JA-17E)¹

Hugo's Jacksonville Road (JA) from Willamette Valley to Jacksonville (route of the *Trail*) is located in Josephine County, Oregon from the Rogue River in the south to Grave Creek in the north.¹⁻²

Virgil Pringle's Diary: 1846³ His October entries near Grave Creek follow.

• Sunday, October 18 – Have some bad road [Oxbow] that takes till after dark to go 6 miles. 6 miles.

• Monday, October 19 – Move one mile to a camp [Grave Creek], having none last night, and spent the day burying Mr. Crowley's daughter, who died yesterday evening, age about 14 years. 1 mile.

Talbot Carter Reminiscences, 1846⁴"Soon a wagon appeared, with weeping and lamentation among its occupants. It was soon learned that an estimable young lady by the name of Crowley, who had been afflicted with typhoid fever, had died.... When morning came we found we were a few hundred yards from a small stream" [Rat Creek]

Wagon Trail Camp At Grave Creek: October 19, 1846¹

Lucy (Henderson) Deady Reminiscences, 1846⁵

"One of the emigrants in our party was named Crowley. He had lost several members of his family

They buried her beneath a big pine tree on the banks of a small stream which they christened Grave Creek, and which still bears that name.

by death while crossing the plains, and at one of our camps another member of the family, a daughter, Martha Leland Crowley, died. Theodore Prater and Mrs. Rachel Challiner and some others from our wagon train helped bury her. They buried her beneath a **big pine tree on the banks of a small stream** which they christened Grave Creek, and which still bears that name." (emphasis added)

Levi Scott's Reminiscences, 1846⁶ "The next morning we moved up a little, and crossed the main creek, where we stopped to bury the dead girl.

The South Road, 1846⁷ "The next morning, the wagon train moved about one mile and crossed Grave Creek where the covered bridge is now."

According to Davis "Miss Martha Leland Crowley was buried in the road one-fourth of a mile north of the crossing.... The road became the main road to California and was paved some years later. The remains of Miss Martha Leland Crowley still lie under the pavement, one-fourth mile north of the covered bridge and the Sunny Valley Interpretive Center."

Diaries, Journals, & Reminiscences¹

SUMMARY On Sunday, October 18, 1846 the wagon train camped within a few hundred yards of Rat Creek. The next day, Monday, October 19, 1846, the wagon train traveled one mile and camped in a prairie after fording Grave Creek. The rest of Monday was spent in burying Martha Leland Crowley at the camp.

The camp location was in a east-west prairie north of Grave Creek identified on an 1856 GLO map based on a 1855 GLO survey (Map 1). Our research identified the 1846 camp location to be approximately in the location of *Trail* site JA-17B⁸ which is 370' west of the Sunny Valley Road and 650' north of Grave Creek, not a quarter- mile $(1,320')^7$ north of Grave Creek which would place the camp site north of Leland Road.

"The next morning we moved up a little, and crossed the main creek, where we stopped to bury the dead girl.

Land Use & History


