1928 The Hutton family arrived in Oregon via automobile (Model-T) from North Dakota in 1928.

1929 - 1930 They needed more room for the high school which was on the north side. The grade school was in the old south section. The high school students were moved down to the first school and old grange hall (now Hugo Ladies Club) while the high school was being renovated.

Hugo High School was Marjorie Hutton's best and most enjoyable high school. Her first year of Hi school was at Merlin, Oregon and her second year was at Grants Pass, Oregon.


Earl Brown was the school teacher during Marjorie's senior year at Hugo Hi in Hugo, Oregon. He was one of the finest teachers she ever had. She and all of her fellow students were well acquainted with Mr. Brown's father who was called "Strawberry Brown" because he raised strawberries. He also played the fiddle at the local community dances. Earl's brother, Orla, was 10 years younger than Earl and also a teacher.

Marjorie Hutton, Hugo High School Graduate: 1934

1934 Hugo High School Graduation Vivian and Marjorie Hutton both graduated from Hugo High

School (Hugo Hi), Vivian in 1933 and Marjorie in 1934. There younger brother, Paul, was also a Hugo Hi graduate, perhaps 1938.

Marjorie was a waitress for a few years after graduating from Hugo Hi — at the Redwood and Del Rogue hotels, Cave Shop in Grants Pass, Plaza Cafe in Ashland, and Astoria Hotel in Astoria. Marjorie also worked at two different meat markets in Grants Pass during WWII and the Oldsmobile Garage in Klamath Falls. She worked in the parts department and delivered cars. One time she felt a little "squeamish" when it came time to deliver a hearse and refused to do it — and she did not get fired. ☺

Hugo High School: 1932- 33 & 1933-34

Marjorie attended business college in Medford and Grants Pass. She never pursued an office job, but found her training very helpful down through the years.

Paul Guisinger. Paul Guisinger graduated from Hugo Hi around 1938. His sister Vivian was in Grants Pass working and Marjorie was married when he was a senior. As a youngster Paul was very interested in radios and airplanes and later had his own radio shop and plane.

At one time he was employed with the Minnesota Mining Company in Chicago where he was involved in inventing of different kinds.

Paul sold his plane, but for relaxation and outings he would occasionally rent one. He rented one in the fall of 1958, but never returned. It is believed that he went down in the Great Lakes or vicinity. An extensive search was made, but he was never found. This was a very stressful time for the Guisinger clan for many years.

Marjorie was in her late 20s when she became employed as the 2nd cook and 2nd maid at the A.S.V. Carpenters near Jacksonville for two years when her daughter was little. They were millionaires in the full sense of the work — it was a nice experience.
