1908 Claibore Triplett sold approximately 10 acres to Thomas and Elva Ahern in May 1908. The Aherns raised cherries and apples on the property. They constructed the packing sheds and other sheds on the property between 1910 and 1915. The farm was called the "Cherry Hill" Fruit Farm when the Aherns had it.<sup>1</sup>

**1932** Elva Ahern owned the 10 Ahern cherry farm.<sup>2</sup>

Late 1930s Cherry Packing<sup>3</sup> While at Hugo Beatrice individually hand-packed dark-red Bing and Lambert cherries for John Peterson, and later for the Lingle family. The Lingle family's orchard was up the hill from John's orchard, but both were north of the railroad tracks. Royal Anns were not packed because they were too perishable. Packing cherries meant putting cherries into boxes (around 8" x 16" x 6"). You would put the cherries into the boxes in a row trying to place the nicest part of the cherries face-up with the next row covering the stems of the first row. After the first layer of cherries was placed you would place a divider over it and start another layer of cherries. The cherries had to be perfect with no damage or blemishes. The cherries were usually taken to the Hugo depot and shipped by train to San Francisco.

Cherries & Apples

Mrs. Lingle picked Beatrice out to do the fancy boxes of cherries. She worked faster than Beatrice, but her boxes did not have to be perfect.

### "Cherry Hill" Fruit Orchard

**1955** Lester F. and Irene [Ahern] Lingle were in possession of the "Cherry Hill" Fruit Farm in 1955.

The Aherns bought the property from the Tripletts. It was used as fruit orchard. The Aherns had a daughter called Irene Ahern and she married Lester Lingle.<sup>5</sup>

Ahern Road Lingle maintained that the Ahern Road was a legal road and he had a right to use it across the Peterson place. Mr. Peterson said he is not going through there. There was a big fight and a lot of discord over the years over the use of the Ahern Road by Lingle. The reason Lingle wanted to use the upper road (i.e., Ahern Road) was because it was higher and, therefore, drier in the winter, then the other road which went south and had wetness problems.<sup>5</sup>


