"The new home of W. I. Regis had a fire one day recently. Children visiting with their mother at the Regis home secured matches and set fire to the paper on the wall in the hall, and this was communicated to the bed room adjoining. Much of Mrs. Regis clothing was destroyed before Mr. Regis could extinguish it." Rogue River Courier. June 2, 1911. Three Pines.

"Mrs. W. L. Regis and little daugher, have returned from an extended visit with friends at Galice." Rogue River Courier. August 25, 1911. Three Pines.

1911 — Town of Three Pines, Oregon Platted

"Know all men by these presents: — That we, George A. Steel and Cora Steel his wife do hereby dedicate without any reservations or restrictions whatever, to the free use of the Public all the land represented as Streets, Alleys, Drives, Roads, Walks, and Places upon the annexed plat of Three Pines in Josephine County State of Oregon and described in the annexed affidavit of Fred Mensch, who surveyed said lands In Witness Whereof. We have hereunto set our hands and seals this 30th day of May 1911."

1912 Three Pines was recently developed and a going concern in 1912 with over a hundred citizens; a brand new one-year old school, Three Pines Elementary; two stores; the Corliss Hotel; a post office; a planning mill that was connected by a 11.5 mile flume to the upper reaches of Jump-off Joe Creek and the lumber town of Mountain; and a railroad siding and small depot. The town was platted and there was the Three Pines Fruit Tracts just to the east. The new year was coming and the future was bright.
