1911 — Town of Three Pines, Oregon Platted On May 30, 1911 George A. Steel and Cora Steel dedicated to the free use of the Public all the land represented as Streets, Alleys, Drives, Roads, Walks, and Places upon the plat of Three Pines in Josephine County State of Oregon.

1912 Three Pines was recently developed and a going concern in 1912 with over a hundred citizens; a brand new one-year old school, Three Pines Elementary; two stores; the Corliss Hotel; a post office; a planning mill that was connected by a 11.5 mile flume to the upper reaches of Jump-off Joe Creek and the lumber town of Mountain; and a railroad siding and small depot. The town was platted and there was the Three Pines Fruit Tracts just to the east.

1925 "In 2000 Verlin remembered an old garage type of building (approximately 18' by 20') in the location that Clarence Kolkow indicated was the old green Three Pines Post Office building that closed in 1921. In 1925 the Booher family moved into this garage when they got kicked out of the hotel after Ed Kolkow bought the hotel for the wood. Ed Kolkow used the wood to expand his home (or build a garage) at the Oxyoke Service Station."
