1928 - Sommers Moved To Hugo Maude and Andy Sommers and their sons, two-year old Clarence and 11-year old Eugene, moved to Hugo, Oregon in 1928. Truman and Emma eventually also moved to Hugo.

1929 Times were hard, as it was the start of the *Great Depression* in 1929. All the people helped each other and shared food

1932 - June Born June Ione Summers was born in Hugo, Oregon in April 1932. She came into this world in a little house they called the Red House on a lane across from where Fern (McKy) Larsen and her parents lived. She was the nurse that attended June's birth.

June Sommers' Hugo Memories: 1928 - 1936

1928 - 1938 While in Hugo, the family picked cherries at the cherry orchards. Her father, Andy Sommers, went where ever he could to find work. There sure wasn't much money to be had and everyone was in the same boat. The Sommers family moved several time while in Hugo; for example they lived at the Coburn place near the Grime's in the Town of Three Pines and at the Dean homestead.

June's father, Andy Sommers, had a great sense of humor and a gift for gab. He told his kids many stories of their life in Hugo. He also loved music and dancing and promoted dances at the Community Hall. Everyone that could play instruments would gather and the families came along.

A Metsker map records that in 1932 Andrew Sommers had a 10 acre farm.² The Sommers family also owned a new cabin somewhere on a road that circled around back of Hugo.

1934 June's brother, Clarence, graduated from Hugo High School.

1935 - 1936 Once when June was real little, Bertha Brown and she took off for the pond out in the pasture and had everyone looking for them. When they found them they were happily splashing around in the water that was pretty deep; both of them could have drowned. Another time June was all dressed up in a little red dress and her mom was carrying a pie while they walked across a pasture. They were going to a social event. All of a sudden her mom saw a bull coming fast toward them. She screamed, "Run!" to June and they both ran to the barb-wire fence. Her mom went over the fence while June slid under it. Amazingly nothing awful happened to either of them, or to the pie. The bull must have really hated June's dress.

1937 In 1937 the Sommers' family was living at the Coburn place. It was quite a ways off of Hugo Road (today called Three Pines Road) near the Grimes house in Three Pines. The Sommers could hike a short ways north over the hill to the town of Hugo when they needed something at the Hugo Supply Company.

1938 The Sommers family was living on the Dean homestead west of Three Pines. That same year they, including six-year old June, left Hugo and moved to Grants Pass, Oregon.
