1885 Hugo Homestead Clementina Trimble was issued a homestead patent for 171.66 acres in Hugo, Oregon in 1885 (Patent No. 1781).¹ Wood Feree and Robertshaw owned the old Trimble homestead in 1895.²

Thomas's occupation was wood chopper.

1904 - 1908 Thomas and Minta Wise purchased the property in 1904 from James Robertslaw. He was particularly known throughout the area as a breeder of thoroughbred Jersey cows. Wise farmed the land until his death in 1908.

In the 1910 census George was identified as a farmer; Thomas was a hired man. The ultimate 300 acre Wise-Tavis ranch was comprised of the old Trimble homestead and, land from the railroad, and more parcels.³

1911 The members of the Wise family granted their parts of the farm estate to their brother-in-law, George W. Tavis, a resident of Washington state. George immediately moved to the farm and took over the stock operation.⁴

ca., 1917 - 1920 Mr. Hill was a teacher at the Quartz Creek School. He taught Margaret's older brothers. One time adults George Tavis and Buck Buffington came on horse back and rode around the Quartz Creek School when Dick Bland was attending the school. The two men were dressed as Indians and were whooping and yelling and scared the school kids half-to-death.⁵

Wise-Tavis Pole Barn

1917 George Tavis returned home from Harrisburg where he spent the summer.⁶

1920 George Tavis and Alex Tavis, of Hugo, visited at the Ludwick home Monday evening.⁷

1920 The Tavis family farmed there until George was killed when struck by a Southern Pacific train on July 16, 1920.^{4&8}

1932 Thos. L. Wise was in possession of the farm.²

Importance⁴ The Tavis and Wise families were well known through the Merlin-Hugo area and relatives continue to reside there. The barn is one of the oldest barns in the Merlin-Hugo region and the complete pole construction is unique.


