In the 1910 census George was identified as a farmer; Thomas was a hired man. The ultimate 300 acre Wise-Tavis ranch was comprised of the old Trimble homestead and, land from the railroad, and more parcels.³

Tavis Settler Family, Early Settlers: 1911 - ca.,1920

1911 The members of the Wise family granted their parts of the farm estate to their brother-in-law, George W. Tavis, a resident of Washington state. George immediately moved to the farm and took over the stock operation.⁴

1920 The Tavis family farmed there until George was killed when struck by a Southern Pacific train on July 16, 1920. 4&5

Man Ground To Death Under Train Wheels⁵

George W. Tavis was instantly killed early Sunday morning when he was run over by a freight train which he was attempting to board. According to people who witnessed the accident, Mr. Tavis waited until the long freight was nearly past then mad a leap for one of the end cars. He lost his grip and was thrown under the wheels. He was dragged about 150 feet from the point where he tried to board the train.

Mr. Tavis had come down from Merlin, where he resided, Saturday to do some business and meant to take the train back Sunday morning. He found that the train north was marked up late and as he and his wife were expecting company for dinner, he was in a hurry to get home. He was standing near Sixth street when the freight started pulling out. Thinking that he would be able to get home much earlier by riding on the freight he attempted to catch it but failed and fell beneath the wheels.

Mr. Tavis was born in Illinois in October 1867, making him 52 years of age when the accident happened.

Continued He was well known here, having been in business here at one time. Mr. Tavis and his family came to Merlin six years ago from Stevens county, Washington. He leaves a wife, Emily Tavis, and five children, the youngest being a son 14 years of age. Two married daughters are expected in from Spokane tonight.

The funeral service was held at the I. O. O. F. Cemetery at 2:30 Tuesday afternoon.
