Hugo's Emigrant Applegate Trail (*Trail*) Map Quads

At one level the goal of the Hugo Emigrant Trails Committee to collect and record information about Hugo's emigrant trails, especially its two historic 1855 - 1856 roads of the *Trail* as surveyed and mapped by the General Land Office (GLO).¹

- Road from Willamette Valley to Jacksonville (route of the Applegate Trail)
- Road to Illinois Valley via Van Noys Ferry (route of the Applegate Trail from Widow Niday's place to ferry location on Rogue River)

The *Trail* routes of interest are collectively approximately 17-18 miles long from Louse Creek in the south to Grave Creek in the north.

South to north five USGS topographic quadrangles cover the geographic area for the *Trail* in and adjacent to Hugo, Oregon. They are all in Josephine County, Oregon (7.5 minute topographic series, scale 1:24,000, and contour interval 40 feet).

- (1) Grants Pass, OR Quadrangle 1996
- (2) Sexton Mountain, OR Quadrangle 1996
- (3) Wilderville Quadrangle, OR 1996
- (4) Merlin, OR Quadrangle 1998
- (5) Glendale, OR Quadrangle 1996

These quadrangles can be purchased from the Forest Service and BLM Interagency Office, 2164 N.E. Spalding Avenue, Grants Pass, OR 97526.

Map Codes For Hugo's Quads & Point of Interests (POIs)

The foundation for Hugo's map quad codes is the Oregon-California Trails Association's (OCTA) mapping emigrant trails (MET) program.² The OCTA's coding system comprises six letters-numbers: the first two designate the state involved, the second two designate the trail name, and the third two are the sequential number of the quadrangle for the trail within the state. For example, CA-LA-06 is the sixth map on the Lassen Trail in California.

- (1) Grants Pass, OR Quadrangle 22
- (2) Sexton Mountain, OR Quadrangle 23
- (3) Wilderville Quadrangle, OR 24
- (4) Merlin, OR Quadrangle 25
- (5) Glendale, OR Quadrangle 26

On October 5, 2010 the Mapping and Marking Chair, NW Chapter of OCTA assigned quadrangle numbers for Hugo's area of interest.⁴

Walker assumes that meant that had been no previous work in Western Oregon on the Applegate Trail.

Over time the Hugo trail inventory program added fourteen (14) more letters/numbers to the OCTA's codes

Map & POI Code Purposes

OR-AT-00-34-06-11/14-E-JA-16

OR = Oregon; AT = Applegate Trail; 00 = default quadrangle number; 34 = Township 34 South; 06 = Range 6 West; 11/14 = section line between sections 11 and 14; E = an east GLO surveyed direction on the section line; JA = road from Willamette Valley to Jacksonville; and 16 = the 16th POI of the JA. Not part of the code is the common name for the POI = South Rat Creek.

The 19 letter/number POI identification code will serve several purposes.

- 1. Database. Every map can be entered into a computer database using the code and quad name, plus any additional relevant information. This will provide a means of storing, cataloging, and retrieving POIs that is compatible with OCTA's MET program.
- 2. Filing. Each completed map can be filed for ready reference and accessed when corrections and revisions are made and when users request photocopies for research or preservation purposes.
- 3. Monitoring. With the map code, the map database can serve as a ready means to monitor the status of the *Trail* in the Hugo region.
