1911 D. W. Butler, the strawberry expert, who originated the Corinne variety of strawberry, is putting in a bed of this specie at Three Pines for J. D. Cook, secretary of the Farwell Construction company. Mr. Butler is taking great pains with the planting and the berries are sure to be prize winners as soon as the vines are in bearing. *Rogue River Courier*. March 31, 1911. Three Pines.

1932 The wedding bells are ringing again in this community. Miss Reba Kolkow and James Butler were married Tuesday. A charivari party was given them at the Kolkow home, Tuesday evening (Hugo — Three Pines, *Grants Pass Bulletin*, February 12, 1932).

Mrs. Elizabeth Curtis of Oxnard Cal., is on a visit to this sister. Mrs. Geo. Buttler. The two families left Monday for a trip to Keno. Mr. and Mrs. James Buttler will take a trip to Keno as soon as their truck is fully repaired. *Rogue River Courier*. July 21, 1932. Three Pines.
