1911 D. W. Davis and son Roy, are at work on the building for the shop that they will operate. Considerable machinery will be installed. *Rogue River Courier*. May 26, 1911. <u>Three Pines</u>. D. W. Davis and son are rushing to completion the shop previously mentioned in these letters. *Rogue River Courier*. June 2, 1911. <u>Three Pines</u>.

D. W. Davis is getting out material for the manufacture of lattice work, pickets for fencing and all work in that line. He has his factory well equipped with all the necessary machinery for doing all classes of ordinary wood work.

An installment of the machinery for Davis and Son's shop had been delivered and will soon be installed." *Rogue River Courier*. June 9, 1911. <u>Three Pines</u>.

Roy Davis has returned from Grave and Coyote creeks, where he and his friends had a successful deer hunt. Game is reported to be very plentiful in the sections they visited. *Rogue River Courier*. August 25, 1911. Three Pines.

Three Pines Wood Shop

D. W. Davis is building an addition to his shop to house the engine, the original building being too small. *Rogue River Courier*. November 17, 1911. <u>Three Pines</u>.

C. E. Chapin and Emroy Davis are trapping on the headwaters of Jack creek and will go from there to the country between the headwaters of Jump Off Joe and Grave creek. The are provisioned for a long stay. D. W. Davis of this place caught a large fine red fox in a trap set for coyotes. *Rogue River Courier*. December 1, 1911. <u>Three Pines</u>.

1912 Roy Davis arrived home from the Grave creek placers and has gone with Emroy Davis to the head of Jack creek to join the latter in a trapping venture. *Rogue River Courier*. January 12, 1912. <u>Three Pines</u>.

1912 D. W. Davis is getting out material for the manufacture of lattice work, pickets for fencing and all work in that line. He has his factory well equipped with all the necessary machinery for doing all classes of ordinary wood work. *Rogue River Courier*. January 19, 1912. Three Pines.

Emroy Davis, our merchant, is getting in a stock of groceries looking for a share of patronage. *Rogue River Courier*. November 1, 1912. <u>Three Pines</u>.


