Halaemsi Place

Dipoltsilda, 'on its red banks,' was the name of the present Jump Off Joe creek, an eastern tributary of Rogue river. A Takelma village in the neighborhood of this creek, and on the north side of Rogue river, was the native village of **Daktsasin**. Persons from this locality were termed Daldanziyd, implying as another name for the village **Daldani**, 'rock (is) away from stream.' (Sapir Notes¹, page 256)




If one thought about where the **Daktsasin** Takelma village might in relationship to Jumpoff Joe Creek you would immediately think of the old Neely place.²⁻³ However, the old Neely place is clearly the Halaemsi Place.

Halaemsi Place (Gray⁴, page 82) "Place name between the Wagner house and Jump-Off Joe Creek." Halaemsi is a flat, a long strip between the crossing of Jump-Off Joe Creek and Wagner's house, just a little south of Jump-Off Joe Creek crossing . . . maybe." "On the side of Jump-Off Joe Creek, between Jump-Off Joe Creek and Grants Pass, used to dig camas there." "Old Willamette road and trail that goes up Rogue River passes Halaemsi (Harrington⁵ 1981: 410, 419, 431, 424, 528, 530)."

In 1855 Between Wagner House & Jump Off Joe Creek

1855 Wagner's House & Jumpoff Joe Creek The Wagner's house location is clearly identified on the 1856 GLO Map 1 (T. 35S., R. 5W., WM) and the crossing of Jumpoff Joe Creek identified on the 1856 GLO Map 2. (T. 35S., R. 6W., WM).

1855 Prairie A natural prairie is clearly identified at




Map 1. Section of 1856 GLO Map 1

1895 Neeley Homestead² took advantage of the flat long strip of bottom land that used to be Halaemsi Place (Map 1, Map 2, & Aerial Photo 1).


