Along Illinois Road

Overview Hugo, Oregon like most places has its Native American history, some known, most not. Hugo's first citizens or peoples were the Takelma Indians in the Rogue River Valley.¹

Beckham³ Salwaxkan: [This village was west of the Applegate River on the road between Grants Pass and the Illinois River and was a short distance upstream from the confluence of the Applegate and Rogue. It does not appear to correlate with any archaeological site excavated to date.]

"big red flat back of Hussey's" (Harrington 1981[28]:490). (Beckham 1993: 30-31).


"Salwaxkan was a field across R[ogue] from Mastalow's place. Story of war betw[een] Applegate & Tak[elma] Ind[ian]s app[arently] Talkwa-hata'na was the name of the man who got killed but was brot across river in boat." (Harrington 1981[28]:494). (Beckham 1993: 31).

"we reach Applegate River. She (Frances Johnson]....knows that Salwaxkan is away from bank of Rogue River. Salwaxkan is the little flat, and k[now]s that Talkwa'lk is on s[outh] bank of R[ogue] river in front of Salwaxkan. She heard her mother talking about Salwaxkan in connection with the Illinois road" (Harrington 1981[28]:462). (Beckham 1993: 31).

Takelma Salwaxkan Village

Beckham³ "Salwaxkan is where the ferryboat crosses Applegate C[ree]k" (Harrington 1981[28]:492). (Beckham 1993: 31).

"[Frances Johnson] Says all she know it that Salwaxkan is on the Ill[inois] r[oa]d "outside" R[ogue] River to outside [?] off mouth of Applegate probably. She knows nothing of Ill[inois] r[oa]d going over gap of hills" (Harrington 1981[28]:461). (Beckham 1993: 31).

Villages at Confluence of Applegate and Rogue Rivers. Frances Johnson recalled three village sites: Tatmelmal on the north bank, Talkwa'lk near of grove of cottonwood [balm or "bam" trees] on the south bank west of the mouth of the Applegate, and Salwaxkan, the "big red flat back of Husey's"]. (Harrington 1981[28]:490) (Beckham 1993: 43).

Confluence of Applegate & Rogue Rivers

Gray⁴ Salwaxk'an (Harrington), also possibly Salwal-xa (Sapir) and Sal--wa--qu (Dorsey): "We reached the Applegate River. She . . .knows that Salwaxk'an is away from bank of Rogue River. Salwaxk'an is the little flat. Heard her mother talking about in connection with the Illinois Road (Harrington 1981:410,462)."

"Sal-wa-qu (i.e., @U[Salwa'xa] which probably means 'at the foot of the creek' and which must have applied to a village at the mouth of Illinois River or one of its tributaries [Sapir 1907a:254])."

[The confusion between Sapir's and Dorsey's placement of Salwaxk'an in the Illinois Valley, and Frances Johnson's later statement that it was connected with the Illinois Road, yet near the Applegate/Rogue confluence is understandable, if, in fact, both spellings apply to the same place name. Therefore, I would be inclined to disregard Dorsey's original placement of Sal-ia iu in the Illinois Valley and Sapir's later repetition of this placement, in favor of Harrington's information that it was near the confluence of the Applegate and Rogue Rivers.]


