
Salmon Is King

Overview Hugo, Oregon like most places has its Native American history, some known, most not.



Hugo's first citizens or peoples were the Takelma Indians in the Rogue River Valley.¹


"Talkwal'lk" is on edge of Rogue river, a big balm [cottonwood tree] bunch there, & Salwaxkan is a little inland S[outh] of it. She [Frances Johnson] cannot seem to answer the question as to whether Walwaxkan [Salwaxkan?] is on W. edge of Applegate C[ree]k or not, but it is inland of Talkwa'lk & therefore is a little w[est] of Applegate C[ree]k. It is somewhere near where Ill[inois] r[oa]d starts" (Harrington 1981[28]:463). (Bechham 1993: 32).

Beckham³ On November 3, 1942, John Peabody Harrington arrived at the site and wrote: "we reach Fort Vennoy Hopyard red barn betw[een] ho[u]s[e] & river on left of h[igh]w[ay]" (Harrington 1981[28]:459). (Bechham 1993: 32).

Frances Johnson recalled three village sites : Tatmelmal on the north bank, Talkwa'lk near of grove of cottonwood [balm or "bam" trees] on the south bank west of the mouth of the Applegate, and Salwaxkan, the "big red flat back of Husey's"]. (Harrington 1981[28]:490) (Bechham 1993: 43)

Gray⁴ "Talkwa-lkh: "On the south bank of Rogue River in front of Salwaxk'an (Harrington 1981:489)." (Harrington 1981: 489)." (Gray 1987: 84)

[On the southern bank of the Rogue, west of the Applegate, and slightly west of Salwaxk'an.] (Gray 1987: 84)


