Velocipedes & Speeders

The earliest three-wheel velocipedes and four- wheel track cars were either powered by hand cranking or pedaling, the motion being transmitted to the wheels by chains and gears (see Tunnel No. 9 Section Crew Photo). By the 1950s the velocipede had evolved into the modern motor car when Fairmont began offering a two-cylinder, four-stroke engine (see cover page).

These motorcars, otherwise known as railcars, speeders, jiggers, or putt-putts were used in the fifties and sixties on virtually every rail line in the U.S., including the Southern Pacific Railroad in the Rogue River Valley. Their purpose was to transport personnel and equipment for track inspections and maintenance of way purposes. The maximum speed of most motorcars was and is between 20 to 40 mph.

Southwest Railcar Limited's Speeder Run: April 30, 2004

Did you ever wonder what happened to the speeders? Not surprisingly, the overwhelming majority were scrapped, but a few thousand of these vehicles are still around today in running condition and in regular use by different motorcar clubs. Speeders are unique; so little effort to have so much fun.
