CONCLUSIONS

1. Only the diary information, the 1853 Jesse Applegate Survey information and the GLO Survey information was used. No use was made of the "recollections" as the information they contained was considered to be unreliable.

2. The 1853 Applegate Survey Map shows that the Military Road crossed the river at the location of the Evan's Ferry. This location was recorded as being 11.9 miles west of the Dardanelles.

3. The emigrant diary mileages appear to be quite accurate when compared to the surveyed distances recorded by the Applegate Survey of 1853 between the Dardanelles and Grave Creek. Therefore, they were accepted as correct.

A. The Pringle Diary recorded a distance of 14 miles from the Dardanelles to the ford used by the emigrants of 1846. Therefore, it appears that this ford was located near Pearce Riffle.

B. The Hulin Diary recorded a distance of 13 miles from the Dardanelles to the ford used by the emigrants of 1847. Therefore, it appears that this ford was located west of the later Evan's Ferry location and near Pearce Riffle.

4. Using the current aerial photos and USGS topographic maps, a possible ford site was located that was likely used by the emigrants of 1846 and 1847. This site is at the upper end of Pearce Riffle, and is between Chinook Park on the south bank and Pearce Park on the north bank. Once across the river, the trail likely headed northwest up Rich Gulch (through the bluffs) and then continued west and then northwest through the NE part of modern Grants Pass, Oregon.

5. The site of the ford is shown on the APPLEGATE TRAIL map dated Dec. 15, 2014.
