

Walker's Mill Precinct

1856 Josephine County Created The county was created January 22, 1856 from the western section of Jackson County.

There were only four families identified on the 1856 General Land Office (GLO) maps for in the middle Jumpoff Joe Creek drainage: Harris, Hines, Wagner, and Widow Niday.¹ However, these maps only identified homes on the section lines and/or withing close view of the section lines being surveyed. For example the Walker brothers were there, but not identified on the GLO map.

1860 Federal Census Of Josephine County, Oregon

Walker Brothers On September 27, 1850, the United States Congress passed the Donation Land Act. By 1855 Wesley and Augustus Walker had both settled their 160 acre claims at the foot of Walker Mt. Walker's Mill Precinct was named after the Walker brothers. They received their patent certificates in 1866.

The Applegate Trail remained stable for 28 years in the location of the Jumpoff Joe Creek crossing on Augustus Walker's donation land claim from 1846 through 1874 and perhaps as late as 1891.

Parts of the original Applegate Trail were surveyed by Josephine County in 1874.³ The 1874 Jumpoff Joe Creek bridge crossing is in the same location as it was in 1856 (Map 1).

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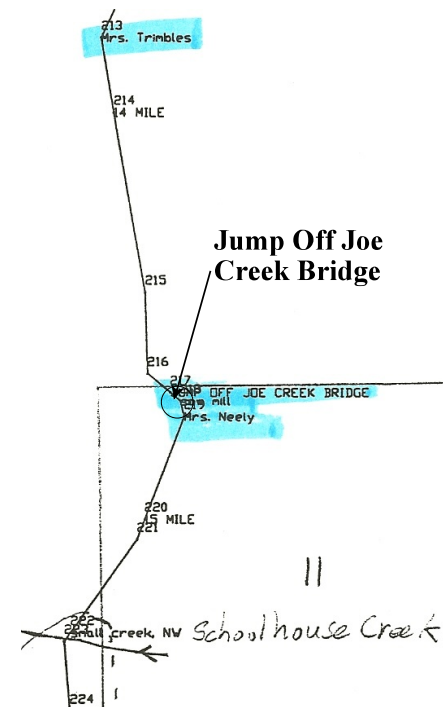
