Quality of Rural Life One of the ways the *Hugo Neighborhood* aims to best promote the social welfare of its Hugo neighbors is by collecting, preserving, interpreting, and researching its rich local history, and encouraging neighbor's interest in the history of the Hugo area, in their geographic place, in their community. We know the quality of rural life in Hugo is enhanced through citizen knowledge of its history and the sense of community that a historical perspective facilitates.

Hugo's Settler Brochure Series For purposes of the Hugo's Settler brochure series, an early Hugo settler includes anyone who lived, worked, or owned property there sometime from 1900 through the 1930s. At this time there are approximately 450 families part of Hugo's Settler brochure series. The idea is to provide a thumbnail sketch of the settlers for the community to understand its history and/or for descendants to understand their roots.

Hugo, Oregon was defined as the boundaries of today's citizen advisory committees (approximately includes all previous small school districts), including the property comprising Schoolhouse Creek to the Josephine County Sportsmans Park, including the upper reaches of Harris Creek east of I-5 along the old Applegate Trail to the East I-5 Manzanita Rest Area. This program effort is to develop brief sketches of Hugo's settlers (i.e., two-sided brochure).

Sources Of Information The origins of the list of Hugo settlers is variable (i.e., news paper articles, federal land transfers, Official 1895 Josephine County Map, 1932 Metsker map, oral histories, census data, other references, etc.).

Web Publication Web publication comes in several varieties (e.g., final or draft brochure, or *Not Quality Controlled, Nor Edited*, etc.). *Not Quality Controlled, Nor Edited* means there is some information about the settler, but not enough to flush out the inventory.
