
Hugo's Famous Orchards, Vineyards, & Patches

Hugo was known for its famous orchards, vineyards, and patches: cherries, pears, peaches, apples, grapes, walnuts, strawberries, and figs. Peak production occurred after the Southern Pacific Railroad arrived in 1883. Over two dozen commercial orchards were in production between 1900 and 1950.



Hugo's most famous orchards were: Cherry Hill, Cherry Queen, Echo Cove, Pear-adise Hill, and Hugo Fruit Farms.

The "Fancy Pack"

The Pear-adise Hill (Holgate-Matusek) Orchard specialized in pears. Mabel Holgate (see title panel), a physician and local Hugo orchardist, specialized in the "Fancy Pack." She was far ahead of Harry & David Bear Creek Orchards in marketing and packaging her fruit.



Local Hugo tradition is that Mabel sold pears world-wide as far as the East Coast and Europe. This was during the days of the railroad and ocean freighter.
