Hugo's Trails: 1855 - 2010

Evolving Transportation Systems There were several land transportation systems before and after the official Pacific Highway from 1913 to 1926 in southwestern Oregon: from Indian trails to pioneer trails and wagon roads following water courses, and during the auto age from dirt and granite roads to narrow paved roads, and finally the four lane, and larger, interstate 5 (I-5) freeway.¹

A trail, or track, is a simple thoroughfare used for travel. Trail systems may be used for community travel in less developed villages, for commercial purposes such as moving cattle herds, or recreational purposes such as hiking, cycling, or cross-country skiing. Trail systems maintained by government entities may explicitly designate recreational trails as being restricted to pedestrian or bicycle traffic or may place other restrictions depending on the intended use.
