## **Death Of Hugo Garber** *Rogue River Courier*, April 26, 1912

Hugo Garber who for nearly 30 years resided at Hugo, the little town north of Grants Pass, and which was named for him, died at the Palace hotel in this city Saturday morning, shortly after 11 o'clock. Death was caused from Bright's disease from which he has been a suffer for some months.

Mr. Garber was born in Hamburg, Germany, August 14, 1854, coming to this country over 30 years ago, most of this time being spent at Hugo. He was unmarried and had no relatives in this country. Two sisters and one brother live in Germany.

Hugo Garber was well known in Grants pass and throughout Josephine county. Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon at Hall's chapel on North Sixth street. Interment will be in Granite Hill cemetery. Hugo Garber, who died at the Palace hotel in this city Saturday was laid to rest in the Granite Hill cemetery this afternoon. Funeral services were held at Hall's chapel on North Sixth street, where friends gathered with formal offerings.

A sister and a brother reside in Germany, the country from which Mr. Garber came over 30 years ago. He leaves no relatives in America.

Rev. William R. Jeffrey of the Newman M. E. church preached the funeral sermon at the chapel at 2 o'clock.

The dead man leaves property and money valued at about \$5,000 and John Blalock has been appointed administrator.
